





Why was the program created?

Lack of affordable housing supply has culminated in a housing crisis in the West. As communities scramble to tackle this problem, the demand for highly skilled professionals in the affordable housing sector is growing. This certificate program is designed to help meet that demand, by providing professionals with both the foundational & technical knowledge needed to build more quality affordable housing and more equitable communities.



Who is the program designed for?

The program is designed for: 1) Professionals currently working in the housing sector (real estate professionals, developers, planners, attorneys, civic leaders, property managers, architects, lenders, etc) who are looking to upskill, and 2) Professionals looking to reskill to transition into work in the affordable housing sector. University graduate students may also apply for this program to enhance their learning.



What are the program courses and how are they structured?

The program features 8 course modules that can be completed in 8 months: 1) An Orientation Workshop/Overview of Affordable Housing, 2) Housing Policy, 3) Legal/Regulatory Context: Planning, Zoning & Entitlement, 4) Social Dimensions of Affordable Housing, 5) Affordable Housing & Project Finance, 6) Construction Managment, Design & Innovations, 7) Development & Managmenet of Affordable Housing, and 8) a Capstone Project.



Are courses online or in-person?

Coursework will be primarily online, but participants will be required to attend 2, in-person/weekend-long intensives at DU's campus at the beginning and end of the program.



How much does it cost?

The total program cost is \$7,500. Note: This fee does not include travel/lodging costs for the weekend-long, in-person Orientation Workshop or Capstone Project in Denver.



How long is the program?

The program can be completed in 8 months and will be held from late Sept. - early June. Each monthly, online module will last 3-5 weeks. In-person intensives will last approximately 2.5 days (1 weekend each).



Who are the instructors?

Participants will learn from DU faculty as well as professional experts in real estate, construction management, law, social work, and public policy,

What certificate will I receive?

This is a non-degree program. No transcripts or credits will be given. Upon completion of the program, participants will receive an Executive Certificate in Affordable Housing.

When does the program start?

The program will begin September 20-22, 2024, with an in-person, weekend-long Orientation Workshop on DU's campus in Denver, Colorado.



Are there eligibility requirements? How do I apply?

Applicants should have a bachelor's degree or equivalent professional experience. Program registration opens on June 3, 2024. To apply, please visit: www.du.edu/affordablehousing. The deadline to apply is July 31, 2024. Acceptance notifications will be sent by: August 9, 2024.



What is required to complete the program?

Completion of the program will require: 1) In-person participation at both the September & June weekend-long intensive modules (at DU's campus in Denver), and 2) Substantial participation (75% attendance) at each of the remaining online models. If necessary, students will be allowed an additional year to make up any incomplete/missed modules.



What are the approved payment options?

Payment of the \$100 application fee can be made online via credit/debit card. Upon acceptance into the program, payment of the program fee can be made via check, wire transfer, or credit card. Payments may also be made in installments (one-third by Sep. 1, one-third by Sep. 19, and one-third by Dec.1).
