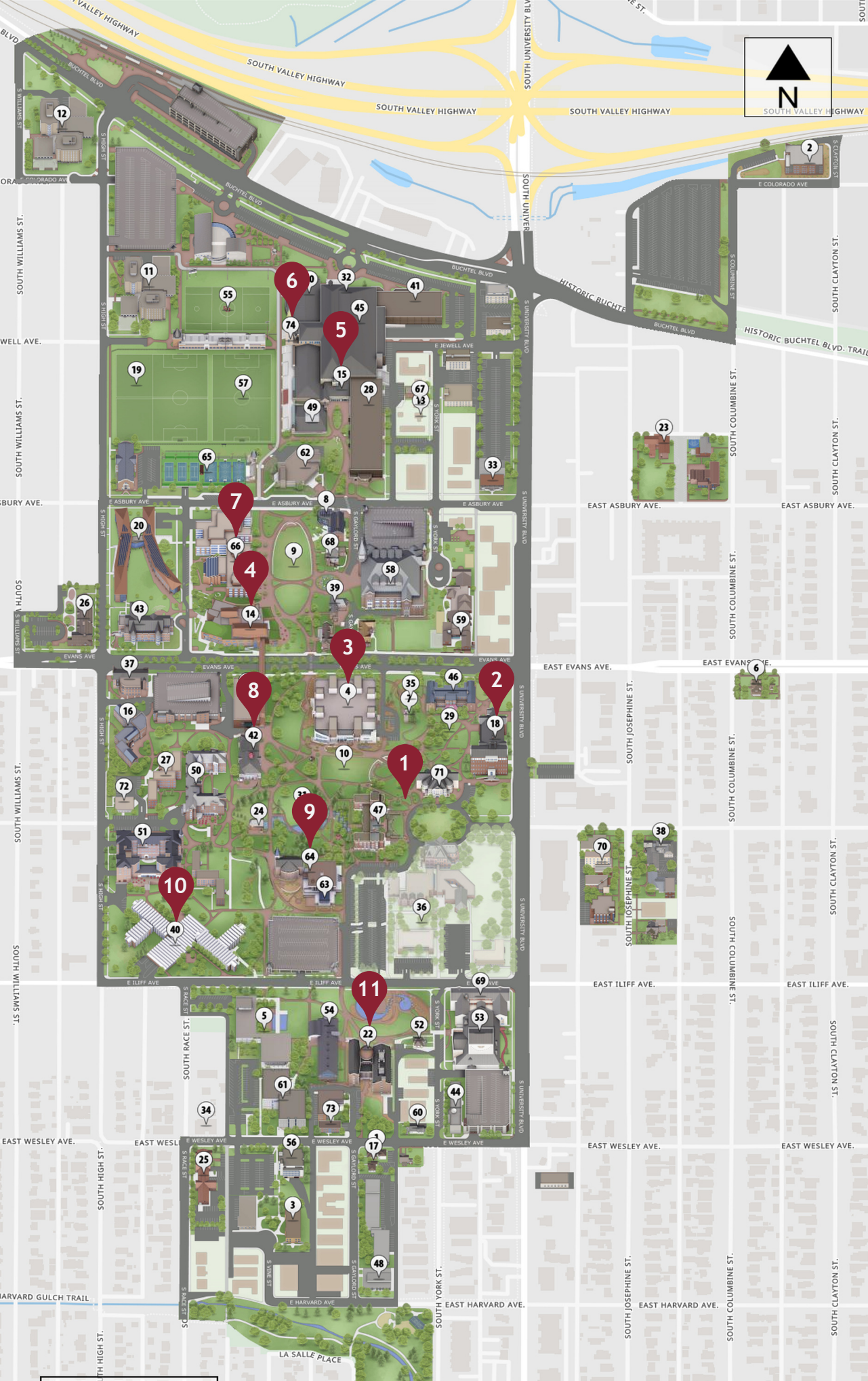

1 Mary Reed and University Hall

University Hall was the first building constructed after campus moved South. The university was originally located in Downtown Denver.

Daniels is known for its emphasis on ethics, with highly-ranked undergraduate and graduate programs. If you were to travel through this building, you would not only see the Marcus Commons and study rooms where many students work collaboratively, but you would notice that the classrooms are a very modest size.

3 Anderson Academic Commons



The Anderson Academic Commons is the academic hub of the DU campus. With renovations completed in 2013, this state-of-the-art building goes beyond a traditional library - it includes spaces for students and faculty to engage in discussion and scholarship, as well as centers for assistance with writing, math and sciences, digital media, technology and research.

The Coors Fitness Center is our gym here on campus. The first floor has lifting equipment, machines, a rock-climbing wall, and racquetball court. The second floor overlooks the weight area and is geared towards cardio, with treadmills, stair steppers, and ellipticals. There are studios that offer yoga, Pilates, Zumba, spin, and many other fitness classes. The Health and Counseling Center is also located in this building, where you can make medical appointments for both mental health and physical health. These two facilities demonstrate DU's emphasis on holistic health and wellbeing for students.
